News from the Churches

COOKHAM RISE

I sometimes think the Smaller Churches’ Newsletter is a bit like Radio 4, which tells you what is going to happen in the news bulletin, then tells you about the news in detail – just as we look forward to events in the future and then tell the other churches about them when they’ve happened! But at least we don’t go on to sum up by telling you what we’ve already told you as Radio 4 does!

November 23rd saw a concert in the church from *Echoes of Swing* – the jazz band which practises in the Wesley Hall each week. The band played “big band” numbers to an appreciative audience and we raised some money for church funds and for our project this year – Ludhianna Hospital in India. Our Christmas Coffee Morning on 8th December was a busy morning and raised over £200.



We held our church Christmas lunch on Sunday 16th December, when 34 people sat down to turkey with all the trimmings followed by Christmas pudding and mince pies – I think everyone enjoyed the food and the company. The previous day was our children’s workshop (for primary school-age children), this year entitled *Christmas is Coming – let’s get Ready!* Because schools broke up so late this year, we had to hold this on a Saturday – we usually go for the Thursday before Christmas. Only eleven children attended (whereas we would normally expect over 20), but they enjoyed themselves making lanterns, doves, table decorations, gingerbread and a picture showing Mary & Joseph on the road to Bethlehem, and going into the church to think about what we do when we get ready for Christmas and what Mary would have had to do to get ready for the birth of a very special baby.

On the evening of Thursday, 20th December the Ladies Circle invited everyone to a carol service, led by Rev Andrew Baker, at which the ladies did the readings. This was followed by mince pies in the Wesley Hall. Our church carol service by candlelight was on Sunday 23rd December at 4 p.m, led by myself and Kathy Rickman; it was followed by refreshments and – surprise, surprise! – more mince pies.

An average of 8-10 of us took some time out each week from our preparations for Christmas during Advent to look at “Four Advent Songs” – the Song of Zechariah, the Song of Mary, the Song of the Angels and the Song of Simeon. And yes, before there are “letters to the editor”, I know Simeon came after Christmas, but the story's themes of waiting and hoping fitted in well with Advent, and Simeon's speaking of Jesus's future and the sword that would pierce Mary's heart reminded us that Jesus didn't stay a tiny baby in a manger but grew into a man who taught and healed and died. I like the carol *The Infant King* which urges us not to wake the baby because “the cross, the nails, the piercing” will come soon enough. And I like the last verse which says:

Hush, do not stir the infant King.
Dreaming of Easter, gladsome morning.
conquering death, its bondage breaking:
sing lullaby!

We were delighted that Rev Andrew Baker and Rev Malcolm White (the Burnham one!) were able to join us for these Advent studies – it brought a different dynamic to what would otherwise have been a meeting of the 'usual' people.

There was a note of sadness to our Advent preparations too as one of our members, Norma Fiske, passed away on 7th December. Norma was an inspiration to many of us and about 90 of her family and friends from church and elsewhere celebrated her life on 19th December in Cookham Rise church, when Rev Barbara McIntivey (who had been a tower of strength to Norma in years gone by) gave the message.

We at Cookham Rise wish all our friends in the smaller churches a peaceful and joyful 2013.

A cautionary tale from Bob Quarterman:

Gift Aid, or Robbery? Beware...

I feel I just have to make all of you who Gift Aid, either to your church or favourite charity, aware of my experience. I have Gifted Aided now for many years. After all, if we can claim back some of the tax we pay, to aid good causes, why not?

Imagine then my horror, with the added expense of Christmas looming, at receiving a letter from Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs demanding the sum of £130 without any explanation whatsoever. After making a telephone call to them to ask the reason, I was soon enlightened by a very pleasant young lady. Apparently I no longer pay tax. Therefore I should not Gift Aid.

I therefore had to pay back the monies paid to our church for the previous year. Despite the fact that my pension provider deducts tax from my January payment every year, it is not enough. It is apparently not in their remit, to write to the treasurers of churches to say that individuals don't qualify to Gift Aid; they even go ahead and pay it. They don't feel the need to inform the donor.

Check it out all you pensioners who Gift Aid. You may be receiving a letter from HMRC. They want their money back!!!
